


GAEL AND MEISHA DAVIDSON CONTINUED

She worked with the SFC with scientists transferring knowledge of propagation methods. Due to personal reasons Daphne felt that she wanted to pursue a career that she was truly passionate about; she then applied for the WWF. Jerome is from Sandakan, he has recently graduated from university, before that he conducted an internship with the forestry industry. They have been working for WWF for the past two months starting a new project based on restoration ecology. They had been set the task of researching and working with other restoration projects in Malaysia for three months to learn the various methods that have been used to restore.

Daphne first heard about DGFC because her cousin is our very own manager, Peter. Once Daphne had heard about the restoration work Cardiff University aids along the Kinabatangan she was eager for her and Jerome to visit. During their time at DGFC they visited Ladang and Kaboi restoration sites, five years and 11 year old plots respectively. They believe that working with conservationists to understand the impacts of biodiversity on restoration is key to the success of their project.

Jerome's highlight was learning a lot about how the restoration impacts the whole ecosystem and how we can help.

Daphne's highlight was stepping into the restoration sites after the boat ride, she felt very inspired especially by the plot at Kaboi.
