SUN BEAR SIGN SURVEY

Recently Tee Thye Lim and Chiew Lin May invited Miriam, Maca, Samsir and Koko to the Bornean Sun Bear Conservation Centre (BSBCC) at Sepilok, to teach and update them on the components of a sun bear sign survey. After a day of learning at the sanctuary they all came back to DG to carry out an initial sun bear sign survey in the forest surrounding DG. This involved interviewing locals to find out what animals they see in the surrounding forest and whether there is a known sun bear in that area. They then went out into the forest themselves and walked transects to search for claw marks on the trees... which was very positive indeed and shows signs of recent sun bear activity! The next step is to run a camera trapping project in these areas and scout for potential traps sites, this has the overall aim of collaring a wild resident sun bear to gain a better understanding of their spatial ecology.

His PhD will be looking at blood parasites but he was keen to apply this to the bigger picture and wondered what diseases we had here. As he is based in the lab often to collect data he was interested in seeing how we work in the field trapping, collaring and tracking animal data to analyse their movement as it's a very different style of science. His favourite activity was setting up traps for civet collaring and his least favourite thing was the mosquito bites! His next stop will be Danum Valley.




KIRSTY LEACH
